The Great Commandment

Once again, the Pharisees questioned Jesus, "Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?" To understand Jesus' answer, we need to explore the Ten Commandments. The Ten Commandments state what is required in the love of God and love of neighbor. The first three concern love of God, and the other seven love of neighbor" (CCC 2067)

Jewish law consisted of over 600 laws for moral living of which many rabbis tried to put into a hierarchy of importance. All of the Jewish laws or commands are found in the Torah (the first five books of the Bible). The Great Commandment is actually two commands: love God with all you have (Deuteronomy 6:6) and love neighbor as self (Leviticus 19:18). Most rabbis in the time of Jesus would have agreed with him that these two "love" commandments were the most important. For they gave a lens through which people could see God's will in their lives.

The last few weeks, we have heard in the Gospel readings about the abundance of God's love for his people. This week's Gospel turns toward our response to love by reciprocating the abundance of love to God and sharing the abundance of love with others.

Let us pray:

Lord, I choose to love You with my whole heart, mind, soul and strength. I also choose to love all people as You love them. Give me the grace to live these two commandments of love and to see them as the path to holiness of life. I do love You, dear Lord. Help me to love You more. Jesus, I trust in You.

RESPECT LIFE MONTH

As we focus this month of October as Respect Month, reflect on who is your neighbor. How do you show love and charity to neighbors on the periphery? Action: Do a random act of charity today! See sidebar.


This week ends on October 31st - Halloween. Halloween is a derivative of "All Hallows' Eve" as it is the vigil of All Saints (All Hallows) Day, November 1. All Saints Day is a Holy Day of Obligation, and thus a major feast on the Catholic Church's liturgical calendar. This is followed by All Souls Day (November 2). These three days taken together are the "Days of the Dead." Hallow means to honor as holy. During these days we honor as holy the Saints, and pray for all the dead as part of the Community of Saints.
